REACH OUT TO US

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FROM THE FOUNDER'S DESK

Across the world, we are facing circumstances never encountered before. The COVID-19 pandemic is forcing us to make sudden, drastic shifts to our way of life to keep ourselves and our communities healthy and safe. It has been almost a year, and we are all facing the Pandemic bravely. But even in these uncertain times, we can find reasons for hope. While we all face a long road ahead, KIIT and KISS, as universities that stand for compassion and humanity are trying best to ameliorate the sufferings due pandemic. Some of our major interventions in these challenging times are mentioned below -

- 1.Reaching out to three lakh distressed people with food, ration and essential supplies
- 2.Assuring professional education to the children of deceased during COVID-19 in Odisha free of cost
- 3.Running four standalone COVID hospitals in the state with 1200 beds
- 4.Taking care of hundreds of orphans during COVID-19 irrespective of caste, creed, religion, region, gender by funding their entire education and livelihood for family members
- 5.Delivering dry foods with dress materials, study materials to the 30,000 children of KISS at their doorstep in the hinterlands of Odisha since April 2020 every month

Before Odisha lockdown followed by India wide lockdown, the students of KISS were sent back home safely before lockdown after sensitising them about the virus. Young adolescents of KISS conducted awareness campaigns in their tribal district. Their education was supported by Whatsapp classes initially, followed by delivery of microchip and pendrive loaded with class content and now one hour sessions on Kalinga TV. Besides we made their new academic year's books reach them along with essential groceries at their doorsteps.

We have continued learning for our students online despite network and connectivity problems. Our students have also performed well in their board examination. Now our focus is on how to safely and responsibly reopen. Reopening is not like flipping a switch and returning to normal. Even with a gradual approach, we are going to focus on major changes in daily operations to prevent a recurrence of the virus or other outbreaks. Meanwhile, we have done various intervention programmes for girl students so that they don't drop out.

The recent wave of the pandemic hints at disturbing trends leading towards uncertainties across the fronts. However, it is certain that by virtue of our commendable experience in COVID management we would positively execute the safety measures and reach out to our students, guardians and alumni. I have a strong conviction that we will certainly move forward and continue to conquer COVID - 19, prioritising education and welfare of our students. I reiterate my commitment to contribute wholeheartedly while working for our mission to achieve zero hunger, zero poverty, zero illiteracy.

We are an educational institute, 60,000 strong, powered by the belief that a better world - **free from hunger, poverty & illiteracy** - is possible.

THE CHALLENGE

Addressing Tribal Education

TRIBAL POPULATION

8% of India's and 22.8% of Odisha's population is tribal. Despite the constitutional promise of social justice and protection through affirmative action, India's tribal population lives in deplorable conditions in the country's dense forests and remote hinterlands.

CUSTODIANS OF EARTH

These original inhabitants (Adivasi) live a simple & sustainable life, with food grown/ foraged in forests, medicines grown from indigenous plants and their own forms of learning and knowledge, often through tales and oral history passed down from preceding generations.

CYCLE OF POVERTY

Each tribe boasts a rich cultural heritage that is unique from the next; unfortunately, however, tribes across the country are united by vicious cycles of poverty and insufficient access to formal learning.

REMOTE LOCATIONS

Since tribes inhabit remote forests/ hilly terrains, this inhibits their access to adequate healthcare or educational facilities. Many of these areas in Odisha are highly susceptible to extremist Naxal violence & influence

RESIDENTIAL SCHOOLS

The few government or private schools that do exist are largely in residential format, to address the challenges presented by rural underdevelopment.

LEARNING CHALLENGES

Early learning for youth at these schools is compromised by problems such as poor infrastructure, teacher absenteeism, lack of toilets, language gaps between tribal and mainstream languages, additional school associated costs or familial pressure to handle siblings and dropout in favour of working and earning.

KISS was established in 1993 as a **free of cost school** to address these problems with an innovative holistic approach to education, which ensures a focus on **all-rounded development** for young tribal learners. KISS aims to **educate students** while simultaneously providing them with **life skills** that help them integrate into adult life after graduation, along with work skills that make them valuable and competent additions to an ever changing and demanding workforce.

THE JOURNEY

Establishing KISS Foundation



FOUNDING KISS

To ameliorate these sufferings of impoverished tribal communities, KISS was founded in the early 90s by philanthropist and educator, Dr. Achyuta Samanta. He himself faced severe hunger, poverty & loss as a child, and made it his lifelong mission to diminish the sufferings of others, particularly Odisha's many tribal communities. Dr. Samanta firmly believes **accessible & affordable education** is key to this and thus KISS was crafted as a completely free of cost model from this selfless dream.

RESIDENTIAL MODEL IN BHUBANESWAR

Our residential campus in Bhubaneswar is the result of a conscious decision considering factors like the availability of teachers in urban areas, the higher dropout rate in day schools, and education in a far-off capital city ensuring that our students are safe from the clutches of Naxalites. Moreover the spread of Odisha's 62 tribes throughout the 30 districts meant that **creating a centralised structure in the capital city with access to all resources was essential** for KISS to become a centre of education for tribal youth.



THE KISS REVOLUTION

We have always firmly adhered to the principle of having indigenous control of education and taking pride in our diverse tribal cultures, art, dance, languages, folklore and so on. From starting with 125 children in 1993, we are now home to over 60,000 youth across the country, and nurture a **dream of educating 2 million of India's poorest children over the next decade.** Over the last 2 decades, we have learned & grown alongside the indigenous community, working with more than 150,000 individuals.

WHAT MAKES KISS UNIQUE?

HOLISITIC EDUCATION

Our extensive approach ensures that the focus is on thorough development of the students by supporting their growth physically, emotionally, socially, spiritually and intellectually. At KISS, we focus on quality academia, sports, skill training, and extra curricular training - a holistic approach to education.

MOTHER-TONGUE BASED MULTI-LINGUAL EDUCATION

During students' early childhood, we teach them in 6 tribal languages (their mother tongues) in primary classes, to bridge the language gap that tribal students face while transitioning from their tribal language (and many dialects) to the state language of Odia.

SOCIAL INNOVATION

By providing holistic free education as the solution to eradicate poverty, KISS provides a prime example of Social Innovation - targeting poverty by educating children and making them self-sufficient. In the long run, it is hoped this approach will reduce the problem of transmission of poverty to future tribal generations.

EARN WHILE YOU LEARN

This program provides opportunities to our students to earn residual income while they are learning, through part-time jobs and entrepreneurial projects that prepare them to shoulder professional assignments with relative ease, through vocational training & skill development.

UNIQUE FINANCIAL MODEL

5% of total turnover of KIIT is donated to KISS as social responsibility. Additionally, all staff donate 3% of gross salary, in addition to 2-3% from KIIT's contractors/vendors and approx. 15 crore donations from various organisations and individuals, and 3 crore from sale of vocational products made at KISS.

FOCUS ON SUSTAINABILITY

Sustainable development is at the core of KISS both in its focus on the UN's 17 SDGs in its day to day proceedings, in its focus on protecting, celebrating and disseminating the rich tribal culture of Odisha and in the eco friendly and sustainable infrastructure implemented in the campus.

In an effort to reduce language barriers that tribal youth face in primary schooling while transitioning from tribal languages to the state curriculum medium of Odia, KISS implements mother tongue based multilingual education.

This project was initiated with support from the Bernard van Leer Foundation, but is now sustainable and institutionalised at KISS.

INSPIRATION

01

Young tribal learners entering formal schooling for the first time, can be easily overwhelmed by the new atmosphere in classrooms, surrounded by unfamiliar faces and the added pressure of learning from unfamiliar textbooks. Additionally, since children come from various language backgrounds, they often find it difficult to shift from their mother tongues to Odia (regional) language, creating confusion when teachers instruct them in any language other than their mother tongues.

INNOVATION

02

The MTBMLE project implemented at KISS since 2013, addresses this learning challenge by helping young students transition from informal learning backgrounds to formal education, while easing the transition process in classroom transactions by using their mother-tongues. It focuses on teacher's capacity building in relation to early childhood education through multilingual education using multilingual instructional materials developed under the project.

IMPACT

03

25k students directly benefited in the last 5 years improving language proficiency in creative writing, creative art and painting, creative music & dance etc. 150 teachers were trained annually in the last 5 years and 40 resource teachers created to sustain the programme. A child friendly language lab was established alongside a resource hub to enrich young learners including peer group. We also launched a quarterly children's magazine KUSUMA, giving space to children's creativity.



KISS has taken up Handicraft training under HRD scheme in collaboration with the Ministry of Textiles, Government of India.

INSPIRATION

01

KISS undertook handicraft training with the aim of building vocational skills in specialised areas to help our students learn marketable skills that will help them find multiple source of employment in their future careers. This is especially important considering that India is in a unique phase of development where 1 in every 5 persons is a youth under the age of 30. This means our workforce is young. Unfortunately, mainstream schooling only provides theoretical knowledge without any skill building, resulting in educated youth with degrees still being unfit for the skills needed in the job market. This initiative aims to bridge this gap.

INNOVATION

02

Training under this programme covers a wide variety of trades including Terracotta, Paper Maché, Golden Grass and wood Carving. Training sessions in these specialised skills are imparted to over 160 student trainees in 8 batches. Our target is to train 20 students per batch for a duration of 4 months. In this span of time, 576 training hours (at 6 hours per day) are earmarked to cover the curriculum. 16 trained Master Trainers (2/batch) have been engaged to impart assignments.

IMPACT

03

Through this training, students are not only provided with employment for the development of our economy but also helped in developing sensible artistic approach of self-expression for artisans as handicrafts are important carriers of culture, tradition and heritage.



The English Access Micro-Scholarship Program (Access Program) is an initiative of the US Department of State, to provide significant English-language learning experiences to bright non-elite 13-20 year old students

INSPIRATION

01

This project is aimed at helping non-elite students improve their communication and language skills in English. It also has the goal of improving students' appreciation of U.S. culture and values, encouraging critical thinking and open-mindedness, and improving performance in regular school classes.

INNOVATION

02

This project takes numerous fun activities into its fold, including project work, activities that promote reading with comprehension, quizzes, role-plays, skits, dialogues, dramatizations, discussions, debate, language games, simulations, use of newspaper clippings, multimedia usage, internet, riddles, puzzles and group work. Enhancement activities in the form of exposure visits to various locations are also part of the programme.

IMPACT

03

The program provides a foundation of English language skills to 750 talented indigenous students. Thus far, we have hosted five cycles of this initiative since its launch in 2009. Many of our English Access tribal students have been successful in joining specialized higher education degrees like Law, Engineering (B.Tech), Medicine (MBBS), and Diplomas in various Engineering trades and Social Sciences.



Free Employability Training comes under the Affirmative Action program of TCS which aims at providing 100 hours of Free Employability Training to final year undergraduates from SC/ST/BPL/Minorities communities.

INSPIRATION

01

The objective of this programme is to assist college students with after class training with an aim of making them eligible for TCS employment after graduation.

INNOVATION

02

These trainings are provided to 4th, 5th and 6th semester graduate students of KISS. The programme features 40 hours of internal training followed by 100 hours of training by TCS trainers. This second training comprises computer skills, English communication and grammar pertaining to practical use in the business world, analytical skills, aptitude, general and corporate etiquette and mathematics training.

IMPACT

03

KISS has facilitated TCS' Free Employability Training Programme at its campus as well as at a district level for the last 5 years.



From 2009, with the support of the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), KISS has endeavoured to hone the abilities of its Adolescents through Life Skills Education (LSE) based Adolescent Reproductive Sexual Health (ARSH) education.

INSPIRATION

01

The aim of this initiative is to enable adolescents to be better equipped to deal with the demands and challenges in their lives. The proposed intervention at KISS aims at building institutional capacity and networking with other potential institutions to overcome knowledge and skill deficit in the state for the promotion of LSE.

INNOVATION

02

LSE sessions are transacted to students of grades 6-9, through co-curricular approaches by trained teachers covering over 9,000 tribal adolescents. At the college level and school level, peer educators have been trained in the life skills based SRH education and are encouraged to promote life skills education and address myths and misconceptions about ARSH among peers.

IMPACT

03

KISS has emerged as a resource agency with a critical mass of resource persons and a wide range of communication and training materials with socio-cultural sensitivity. Most of the resource material used for the LSE programme in the state were developed and tested at KISS.



Under the banner of our volunteering and internship programme at KISS, students from India and abroad get an opportunity to work with our organisation and learn about the diverse and beautiful tribal cultures of Odisha

INSPIRATION

01

At KISS, we firmly believe in developing synergies with people from different fields and backgrounds, to nurture ideas and learning. Under this program, students from across the world visit KISS to take up study or research in a few chosen fields, building long-lasting bonds with the tribal students they teach.

INNOVATION

02

The objective of this programme is to enable likeminded young students and professionals to be associated with KISS in order to enable creative thought and leadership. The internship will be an ongoing evolving project with the ultimate goal of enabling, empowering and enlightening young professionals about inter-cultural relations including knowledge about Odisha's indigenous population thus leading to a multi-cultural synthesis.

IMPACT

03

Since its launch in 2013, more than 400 interns and volunteers have been part of this programme. Before the pandemic began, KISS had hosted students from multiple countries such as the United States, United Kingdom, France, South Africa and South Korea, among others. Some interns have also come to KISS via the AISEC or ISS programs.



Mission UDAY is a joint initiative by REC Foundation of Rural Electrification Corporation Limited (REC), the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), the Government of Odisha and KISS. This unique partnership between a leading development agency, state government, academic institution and corporate sector, is built on the philosophy that CSR should be a means, and not the end.

INSPIRATION

01

Mission UDAY is designed as multi stakeholder project, envisioned to address the challenges faced by young people for vulnerable tribal communities of Odisha and seeks to position youth at the centre of development initiatives of the State. It will endeavour to create change agents in the community and build youth leaders who can engage in social development processes and influence their peers for the betterment of their communities.

INNOVATION

02

The project aims to build leadership and social entrepreneurship skills of 1000 young boys and girls, and inculcate values of active citizenship so that these young people can, in turn, engage in social development processes in 1000 remote habitations of the State, and influence at least 20,000 more like minded youth to widen the footprint of change. The project is initially being implemented in 19 blocks of Koraput, Malkangiri and Raygada districts, in close collaboration with local administration.

IMPACT

03

The project has created more than 722 change-makers working on various health and social concerns, in the 2 and a half years since its inception. More than 48% of these are women. UDAY volunteers have also worked tirelessly during this unprecedented Covid-19 pandemic; 319 youth reached out to more than 30,000 people in 259 villages to spread awareness on hand washing, sanitisation, using masks, maintaining social distancing and other safety measures.



KISS is the technical support unit for implementing a pilot program on behavioural change communication named as “NUA MAA RA KATHA” on IYCN and WASH partnering with APPI and SAKHA. The program engages a community network of transgender to deliver behaviour change messages in addressing knowledge, attitude and practice gaps in the media dark areas, thereby improving health and nutrition knowledge & practices of pregnant women and lactating mothers while also improving infant and young child feeding practices.

INSPIRATION

01

Through ‘Nua Maa’, transgenders are trained to perform plays on key messages like early registration of pregnancy, IFA and calcium consumption, exclusive breastfeeding, complementary feeding and washing at the community, followed by home visits to pregnant and lactating mothers to help transmit knowledge into practice. KISS is providing technical support and knowledge management to the programme, which is the first of its kind to engage in the mainstream activity of behavioural change communication in the areas of health and nutrition. These fields pose big challenges for the state, country & world as a whole.

INNOVATION

02

For the intervention initially a script was developed for a 15 minutes performance and a group comprising of 4 transgenders to perform at village level. This was facilitated by ‘Bangla Natak’, who developed script and trained the facilitators, guiding them in field performance. After the first phase training and field test of the performance, there was an evident need for more power & contextualisation in the script, resulting in revision. Now, all 60 transgenders are being trained on the script and oriented for home visits, since the 1st week of July 2020.

IMPACT

03

The program commenced from 1st of November 2018 covering 20 Gram Panchayats under Rayagada and Gunupur block of Rayagada districts. There are 60 GP level facilitators are been engaged from February 2018 among which 50 are transgender to deliver the program. For the first time the transgenders are being used as a channel for improving mother and young child nutrition by doing performance at villages and hamlets of rural pockets of Rayagada.



This multi year project, funded by Global Challenges Research Fund, has been awarded to KISS by Cambridge University, UK as one of the partners from India, to engage in research activities on various aspects of tribal food & nutrition security and livelihood.

INSPIRATION

01

In a larger context, this partnership between partners across India and UK will define the requirements for advancing the Green Revolution, set the necessary policy agenda, and define a collaborative research programme focused on sustainable crop production and sustainable resource use. TIGR2ESS will develop and strengthen alliances across a wide ranging network of UK and Indian experts in social science, crop science, hydrology, and policy, creating a two-way knowledge exchange partnership.

INNOVATION

02

Key determinants of a population's health and resilience include heredity, environment, diet, lifestyle and socio-economic factors. Within this framework, education and empowerment are important components that can define theories of change to improve lives and livelihoods, leading to better nutrition, health and economic outcomes. The flagship project - FP6 - which aims to explore the relationships between these factors through assessing needs and piloting innovative intervention models.

IMPACT

03

It aims to develop knowledge and practices with regard to health and nutrition aspects and evaluation of the crop choices of farmers along with the role played by markets in enhancing the livelihood of tribal communities, in accordance with the 2030 agenda of sustainable development.



CHIRAG is a Global Research Translation award (GRTA) project, funded by UK Research Innovations (UKRI) on Sustainable Food Systems. KISS is collaborating with University of East Anglia, UK, in this project along with other Indian Partners - PRADAN and Gramvaani.

INSPIRATION

01

‘CHIRAG: Creative Hub for Innovation & Reciprocal Research & Action for Gender Equality’, the project on Sustainable Food Systems is committed to build a proof of concept for up-scaling community led knowledge and innovation. The objective is to address issues on food and nutrition insecurity in India, a problem faced by a vast majority of women and children, especially from rural and indigenous communities.

INNOVATION

02

This project will bring together information on particular production choices, technologies, diets and consumption practices and their relationship to health and nutrition outcomes. This will be achieved by Community led platform for knowledge generation & exchange and constituency-level round tables to bring together various stakeholders.

IMPACT

03

The activities proposed aim to increase the outreach and impact at the levels of community, local government functionaries, educational institutions and policy makers within specific states and constituencies. It also aims to produce evidence based content for curriculum that can be adapted at different levels.

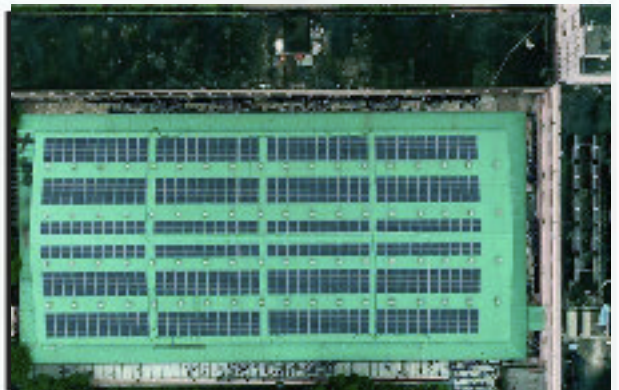

Sustainable Development

The United Nations Resolution “Transforming our World: the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development” has been endorsed in 2015 by all member nations of the United Nations. Now, five years down the road, the UN is observing its 75th anniversary during a year of unprecedented global disruption, compounded by a global health crisis that has triggered severe economic and social upheaval. While navigating these times of crisis, it is critical to understand how the global community can emerge stronger and better-equipped to work towards the goal of sustainable development vis-à-vis the 2030 Agenda.

Thus, 2020 – and the years that follow – must undoubtedly promote dialogue and collective global cooperation, to ensure that no-one is forgotten in the path to a sustainable, better future for all. It is critical that global communities work together to foster dialogue and discussions in various levels, from classrooms to boardrooms & parliaments to village halls, worldwide, while actively engaging marginalised & hard-to-reach audiences, in an attempt to crowdsource inclusive public solutions to global challenges while encouraging local action & bridging gaps between groups & sectors.

As an educational institute and NGO that works tirelessly to empower tribal communities in Odisha, KISS has the vision of sustainable development at the core of its work ethos. Indeed, the institute is powered by the belief that a better world – free from hunger, poverty & illiteracy – is possible. At KISS, we have consistently promoted analysis, advocacy and local action for the SDGs – from implementing innovative initiatives to ensure our campus & learning environments nurture empowered youth who can pave the path for a sustainable future, to strategising and implementing community level projects that foster a vision of sustainable development for Odisha’s diverse tribal communities and rural hinterlands. **Since our inception more than two decades ago, we have worked to empower & engage tribal youth and tribal community members by amplifying their voices** in multi-stakeholder & multi-platform conversations about the path to a sustainable future - voices that are often underrepresented in global discussions.

In this overview, we outline some of our contributions to each of the 17 SDG’s:

Sustainable Infrastructure & Initiatives

One of the ways we express our commitment to sustainable development is through the use of sustainable infrastructure on campus, with an aim of being eco-friendly and sustainable while reducing the carbon footprint of our 30,000 students and staff. In fact, in 2017, KISS was awarded the **18th Energy Globe Award** in the **Fire Category** at the Presidential Palace in Tehran, Iran, in recognition of its green initiatives. Some of these initiatives include:



In an initiative to promote green /clean energy KISS installed a massive **850KWp Solar Photovoltaic system** in its campus. This system meets 100% of its energy demand during day time. This is regarded as one of the largest roof top installations in any institute in India. It fulfils our commitment towards a greener and cleaner environment. Further, it plays a vital role in reducing CO2 emission



KISS distributes large numbers of **solar lanterns** to villages that lack electric connections. This helps to prevent the burning of fossil fuel to create light and simultaneously works as an awareness drive for villagers to have access to clean & safe sources of light.



The **solar water heating system** installed on rooftop caters hot water to kitchen for cooking. It reduces consumption of fossil fuel in addition to cooking time



KISS, being a residential campus, produces large quantities of food waste which are converted into useful energy and manure by our **bio-gas plant**. KISS has built a 1000 kg per day capacity Biogas plant. The product from this plant is fed to our kitchen to supplement cooking activity. Therefore, it reduces fossil fuel consumption. The manure by-product is also utilised in our plantation fields



A **rainwater harvesting system** has been installed to facilitate ground water recharging. Rainwater that falls on the roof is channelled through filters and regulators to a special ground water zone.



KISS has a huge responsibility towards keeping the environment & campus clean. The amount of human waste/sewage produced on a daily basis is humongous. Thus, to create a healthy environment, KISS has commissioned a **Sewerage Treatment Plant (STP)**. After passing through different phases of the STP, the treated water is utilised towards agricultural and flushing purposes. Similarly, bio-stp is established for treating waste water without using any energy source.



Food preparation for 30,000 students is no mean task and it needs the full dedication of our manpower and technology. Since it is also of paramount importance to KISS that the food be cooked hygienically, while bearing in mind the vast volume of food production required, KISS installed 3 **fully-mechanised, steam-based kitchens**, which reduce the time of cooking, minimise fuel & prepare hygienic food by directly using steam in cooking vessels.



KISS also runs a **fully mechanised laundry** to give students ready access to clean clothes. This plays an important role in minimising the use of water, while simultaneously reducing contagious diseases which spread because of unhygienic conditions.



Massive plantation activities in different villages throughout the state of Odisha during the beginning of monsoon serve as a great step to increase awareness as well convert barren field in to lush green ones. Staff, students and villagers, numbering thousands, join hands to promote plantation all over the State

Academic Support at School

At the school level, (Class I - X), students are properly counselled to focus on their formal education. Besides formal education, our focus is on Language Skill development particularly in terms of Learning, Speaking, Reading and Writing. Our teaching methods incorporate a blended learning methodology, particularly for classroom transactions. Our curricula is also tailor-made to ensure that we encourage 360 degree development and growth of our students.

Accordingly, tutoring and mentoring are provided to help students improve their performance in their half-yearly and yearly examinations. With the co-operation and support of our teaching staff, the annual performance of our students remains consistent with a 100% pass-rate in all subjects and zero dropouts.

To this effect, KISS-DU has launched **seven new innovative schools** to give impetus to teaching and research on tribal studies. Each school has been customised and tailor made keeping in mind a tribal centric approach.

HOLISTIC EDUCATION

The model of KISS is unique in providing need-based and demand-driven education for indigenous stakeholders; For us, education is not just about empowering the child, but about providing a starting point for transformation for the family and community as a whole. Through our work, we have found that engaging with a child and his/her family leads to imparting of critical skills such as empathy, collaboration and respect for diversity among tribal communities.

ZERO DROPOUT

KISS provides a model of empowerment for tribal children by shaping & creating a cohort of role models for every tribal & remote village in the country. Throughout the process, KISS addresses 2 major challenges: Diversity & Inclusion. Students not only learn from teachers but from their peers as well. KISS model prepares these vulnerable children as empathetic problem solvers by making the classroom an inclusive laboratory for their ideas & aspirations. Mother tongue based multilingual education removes language barriers and imparts life skills as part of the curriculum for students to build confidence to be self reliant and active partners of development in the process. A sense of identity is instilled in children and their communities for them to co-own and build the movement of creating opportunities for every tribal and disadvantaged child in the country - a concept that has been spearheaded by the mission of Prof. Achyuta Samanta.



GIRL CHILD EMPOWERMENT

With more than 15,000 female students (60% of total strength), KISS has always advocated and practiced Women's Empowerment. At KISS, we focus on empowering our female students, enabling them to become local grassroots leaders, doctors, engineers, teachers and civil servants. We practice Gender Equality by ensuring that our female students receive equal exposure as their male counterparts.

ARRESTING SOCIAL ILLS

As an institution KISS is instrumental in helping to arrest drop-out rates, improve health conditions, reduce human trafficking, arrest child marriage & child labour among tribal communities. Moreover, our innovative 'Earn while you Learn' scheme of vocational training, allows students to send money back home, while receiving hands-on learning for livelihood - this programme acts as a catalyst to eradicate extreme poverty and hunger for many marginalised tribal communities of Odisha, India.



IMPACT

CONTAINING LEFT-WING EXTREMISM

With the contribution and know-how from local grassroots workers about tribal dominated areas prone to left wing extremism, deserving wards from armed insurgent families have been given admission at KISS. Through this process of positive rehabilitation, these students have gone on to excel at academics at KISS. As a result, we have observed an unbelievably sharp decline in terrorist-related incidents in these vulnerable districts in comparison to data stated by the Government of India in previous years. This has paved a way for the mainstreaming of estranged and alienated families through a path of peace, democracy & development. Most students in KISS directly come from insurgent affected districts of Odisha, in addition to another 500 from Bihar, Jharkhand and Chhattisgarh. With a KISS education, professional courses and vocational training, these students graduate from our institute as independent, empowered youth with jobs in hand.



CHANGE-MAKERS

The Alumni of KISS are placed in many of the most respectable and coveted professions. They have made a mark in the field of academics as well as sports, rising to the level of Olympics. Students have also qualified coveted elite civil services of Government of Odisha, reiterating our firm belief that given equal opportunity, there is no limit to what our tribal students can achieve. In fact, the Tribal students studying at KISS are often first generation learners of their families, communities and villages as a whole, and education allows them to hold their own agency and amplify their voices in their communities, as torchbearers and change agents among lakhs of tribal communities.



GRASSROOTS EMPOWERMENT

KISS provides technical support to 500 Government Residential Schools in Odisha to impart Life Skills based training. There are over 100 District Resource persons, 500 Head masters, 1500 Government teachers trained under this programme. Thus, KISS reaches the unreached; covering 75 villages in 20 districts of Odisha and imparting Life Skills Education to over 1 lakh adolescent's boys and girls. Thus, at a macro level it addresses the challenge from cognitive viewpoint. Projects like 'New Mind, New Dream' and 'Go Back to the Village' enable nearly 2000 staff and students of KISS to visit rural and tribal areas annually, during the summer vacation, inspiring change through a variety of initiatives such as plantation drives, literacy initiatives, awareness campaigns and Life Skills Drives. KISS always tries to inspire change at the grass-root level.



CAPACITY TO ASPIRE

KISS is now transforming the lives of more than 0.5 million tribal children indirectly and meeting the hopes and aspiration of tribal population for more than two decades, through interventions in the areas of education, employment, vocational, health, climate change while embodying and inspiring an ideology of peace and development for sustainable development of tribal communities.

GLOBAL NGO RANK 189 BY NGO ADVISOR

KISS has been ranked 189 in the prestigious list of 2019 top 500 NGOs of the World, published by NGO Advisor. Earlier, in 2017 KISS ranked 223 while the institute held the 500th position in 2016. KISS was selected out of thousands of NOGs from around the world for its outstanding impact, innovation, and governance.

LEADERSHIP AWARD BY NATIONAL COMMISSION FOR SCHEDULED TRIBES

KISS was conferred with a Leadership Award by the National Commission for Scheduled tribes, Government of India in February 2019, in recognition of its “provision of wholesome food, quality education and coaching and excellent facility in sports and extracurricular activities” that helps tribal children to “achieve dignity and economic empowerment.”

Sumitra Naik, captain of the Indian Women's Rugby Team, was nominated for the prestigious Children's Peace Prize in 2017. She also holds the distinction of delivering a talk on children's rights at TEDx platform in Pune and being selected as a Youth Venturer by Ashoka Foundation. KISS empowered Sumitra to overcome extreme poverty and tragic family circumstances to become a role model for children and youth across the globe.

100% RECORD IN 10th BOARD EXAMS

In 2002, KISS created ripples in the academic community by achieving 100% result in Class X board exams, against a state average of only 60-70%. This performance has been repeated every year till date. In 2020, KISS posted 98% results over a state average of only 78% As many as 1916 students sat for the exam, which is the highest number from a single school.

100% RECORD IN 12th BOARD EXAMS

In addition to stellar 10th grade exam results, students have also always annually achieved 100% percent results in 12th standard board examinations, showing a retention in performance levels as they progress through higher education.

WORLD CHILDREN'S PRIZE FOR CHILD RIGHTS

KISS received recognition from the World's Children's Prize for Child Rights. It is a recognition given to organisations working in the field of different aspects of child rights.

US FULBRIGHT SCHOLAR

Renowned Professor in Anthropology, Dr. Christine Finnan conducted extensive research on the institute spanning several months. This was the first instance of an American Fulbright Scholar working at any Indian institute.

SATELLITE CENTRES - Odisha



Dr. Samanta's relentless efforts today have provided a platform to replicate this model of education for deprived children across the country and the world. However, due to paucity of funds from only a single source, it has become a humongous task to realize the vision of one individual and dreams of millions of deprived children.

With this in mind, KISS has started approaching organisations and like-minded individuals to come forward and make this a reality across the state of Odisha, other states of India and across the world. This model has been whole heartedly accepted by Policymakers, Individuals, Corporates and Governments alike. **This has led to signings of a few agreements and Memorandum of Understanding between KISS and the organizations to set up KISS model schools.**

KISS began its satellite centers in 2013 in the tribal and backward districts of the state, with the vision to replicate the school in smaller variants. This also meant getting forward and approaching organizations to financially accomplish the goal. **KISS has set up 20 Offices also known as Satellite centers in these districts with a District coordinator manning the offices to liaison with Government organizations and other local bodies.** KISS has also acquired land for the new schools in some of these districts. Some Organizations have already pledged their support and signed MoU's to start schools in these districts. Other Institutes, Governments and Organizations have signed MoU's to begin schools in other states and in their own countries.

Student Case Study:

PUPREN ORAM

Pupren Oram belongs to Mahupada village, Sundargarh, Odisha. Her childhood was marked by fear and violence since her village was repeatedly attacked by Maoists extremists. After years of living in fear, her mother sent her to KISS, far away from all the violence. At KISS, Pupren found immersed herself in school life - alongside studying, she learnt a vocational trade and enrolled in volleyball. She also played volleyball at national level tournaments and captained the KISS team in 2010. Unfortunately around this time, her father was brutally murdered by Maoists. Pupren returned to her village for a few days post his death, but had to be smuggled out soon thereafter due to fear for her life.

Instead, Pupren returned to KISS where she has always found a safe and loving home. She never thinks about her past because it gives her goose bumps but at KISS she has never had to worry for her life and safety. Pupren is unsure what her life would have been had she not found this home; indeed it is a great tragedy for children to spend their youth worrying for their physical safety and for basic necessities, and so KISS has given Pupren the best gift possible - piece of her childhood returned to her.

Dr. Achyuta Samanta, the Founder of KISS, strongly believes that education can be considered the third eye of knowledge for children; one that allows them to discern convolutions of society and act as agents of change and transformation both for themselves and for their communities and societies. For Pupren, education not only gave her a path out from the clutches of extremism, but also motivated her to become an agent of change for her youth similarly stuck in situations like her.

Student Case Study:

CHABILAL MAJHI

Chabilal Majhi, belongs to Kanchanmukhi village in Kalahandi District, Odisha. Amongst her 7 brothers & sisters, Chabilal is the only one to have completed formal education beyond 10th standard. The rest of her siblings are now all married and working as agricultural labour. Her family's subsistence livelihood is completely based on shifting cultivation.

Chabilal recounts that her village lacked adequate healthcare facilities and drinking water, resulting in her losing many friends as a child. These same problems spurred her father to send her to a school a little further on from the village. Despite walking long kilometres to reach her school, Chabilal remembers getting frustrated at being unable to learn much due to negligent teaching. Instead, her father shifted her to another school where she found only one teacher for class-1 to class-10. Luckily, by this point, Chabilal's father heard about KISS in Bhubaneswar, and enrolled her in 2007. Now, Chabilal is studying in +3, delighted to finally be able to study.

Chabilal says, "KISS has given me the opportunity to excel in my life. When I was in class five, I started playing Judo and got selected for national team under Judo-championship (small category) and went to Assam to play the championship. I have played in three national and two international judo championships. Before joining KISS, I had never heard about this game, nor was I aware of its importance in our society. It is not only a game for me but also gives me strength for my self-defence, discipline and control. It has helped me learn valuable social skills while building long-lasting and meaningful relationships with others. Judo makes me feel safe in any situation where strength, technique and intelligence are primary to my safety."

She is thankful to Dr. Achyuta Samanta for providing me this strength, opportunity to conquer the world and become a role model for her village. "Now kids are looking at me and dreaming of growing up like me. And I am very happy that the children of my village are being inspired by me and are excited to move forward", she says..

Alumna Case Study:

MADHAV KEMPRAI

Madhav Kemprai hails from one of the remotest regions of Assam, called Dhansiri in Karbi Anglong district - an area that still struggles with access to electricity, proper transportation & connectivity.

Kemprai's family has four members - his mother, 2 younger brothers, and himself. Madhav lost his father - a petition writer in the Notary office - to a heart attack when he was barely 7 years old. This untimely loss threw the family into turmoil, both emotionally and economically, pushing them to the rim of absolute poverty.

Kemprai's mother struggled to earn a living to feed her three children, and due to these difficult circumstances, was forced to leave her youngest baby at Madhav's grandparents home, about 50km from their village.

For a few years, the family struggled to provide 2 square meals a day, often borrowing food from neighbours for mere subsistence. After 2 years, the family began selling vegetables at a nearby local haat (marketplace), which helped them make ends meet.

At the time of his father's passing, Madhav was in Standard 1 at a private school in the region, while his younger siblings were not yet enrolled in school. However, due to financial constraints, Madhav was forced to switch schools, to instead attend a government school in his region. A year or two later, he was joined at the school by his younger brother, and both completed their primary and middle schooling at that government school. Every winter, during those years, the boys would sell oranges on the roadside to earn money to pay for the forthcoming session's admission fees.

However, within a few years, another event devastated the family...

In 2005, there was an ethnic clash between 2 tribes of Karbi Anglong. As the family slept at night, a group of unidentified persons banged on the door, attempting to break in. Luckily, Madhav and his family sneaked out from the backdoor, and were able to escape being butchered by the militants; others in their village were not as lucky. The Kemprai family walked nearly 10km in the dark that night, finding their way amidst paddy fields, and people's private properties, until they were able to seek refuge at the house of Madhav's mother's friend at a neighbouring town. The following morning, they boarded a passenger train and travelled to their maternal grandfather's home, from where the family went to the Government relief camp for conflict victims.

They lived in this camp for nearly 4 months until the conflict situation was normalised. During this time, they received the sorrowful news that their house had been burnt and destroyed by unidentified goons. In a few months, the government withdrew the relief camp, leaving the Kemprais and other families homeless, wandering around unsure of where to go or what to do. Luckily, they were able to purchase an area of forest land that was meant for resettlement and rehabilitation of those affected by ethnic conflict. The group created a village called Dimaidi, around 30km from their previous home, and settled here. Starting once again without any capital, Madhav's mother struggled to sustain the family's livelihood. The family would collect wood from the forests for sale in the market, and this helped them finance their living, until Madhav completed his Matric board examinations in 2008. At this point, his youngest brother rejoined the family, following the demise of the grandfather he had been raised by. Unfortunately, the grandfather had contracted Jaundice, but the family's state of abject poverty made them unable to raise enough funds to cover timely medical treatment.

After graduating from Class 10, Madhav joined in +2 Science stream at Diphu Government College, about 27km from his new house. Here, he rented a room yet, was more worried about food and house rent expenses rather than focusing on his studies. As a result, Madhav began teaching some school children as a tutor, which unfortunately affected his own education, forcing him to drop out of school after passing Grade 12.

Luckily, at this juncture, he was informed about KISS by Vivek da, then President of All Assam Dimasa Student Union. In his own words, this knowledge completely transformed Madhav's future.

"I am ever so grateful to Vivek *da* because of whom I got into KISS. KISS has not only changed my life but my younger brother too. Just like me, after passing Class 10, he too had lost hope form education and left for Chennai to work in some factory. But while I was going through the admissions process in ISS, I immediately called him to KISS convincing him that he too can now continue his education"

AT KISS, Madhav completed his B. Sc. in Computer Science (3022-2014). His brother pursued a +2 in Science (2011-2013), following which he cleared the medical competitive exam and received admission into an MBBS course at a government medical college of Assam. He is now well on his way to completing his MBBS degree, while also pursuing an internship at the same college.

As for Madhav, after completing his B. Sc from KISS, he went on to pursue a post-graduate MA in Development Studies from Azim Premji University in Bangalore, on 100% scholarship. He is now pursuing a PhD from Tata Institute of Social Sciences (TISS), Guwahati. He has also been involved with a grassroots NGO based in Bongaigaon district of Assam, wherein he worked on community development programs, particularly in the livelihood sector with several vulnerable communities comprising both minorities and tribals from the region.

He was also trained in archery during his time at KISS, under the supervision of Mr. Rajesh Hansdak; a renowned archery coach of Odisha. Madhav represented KISS at the Inter-University Tournament conducted in 2011, in addition to participating in 2 state-level archery tournaments. He credits KISS' unique model of combining mental and physical education through sports in helping him develop critical thinking alongside understanding the world better. In his own words, Madhav says " Without KISS, forget about the PhD, I would not have even been able to complete my bachelor degree, without which I definitely would not have been in the place where I am now. Similarly, my younger brother would not have been a Doctor today had he not joined KISS. Now everybody can feel the happiness of the distressed mother, when she finds both of her sons are highly educated and well placed only because of KISS. I again would like to express my sincere gratitude to the Founder of KISS Dr. Achutya Samanta for teaching us how to fish and thereby enabling us to break the cycle of poverty.

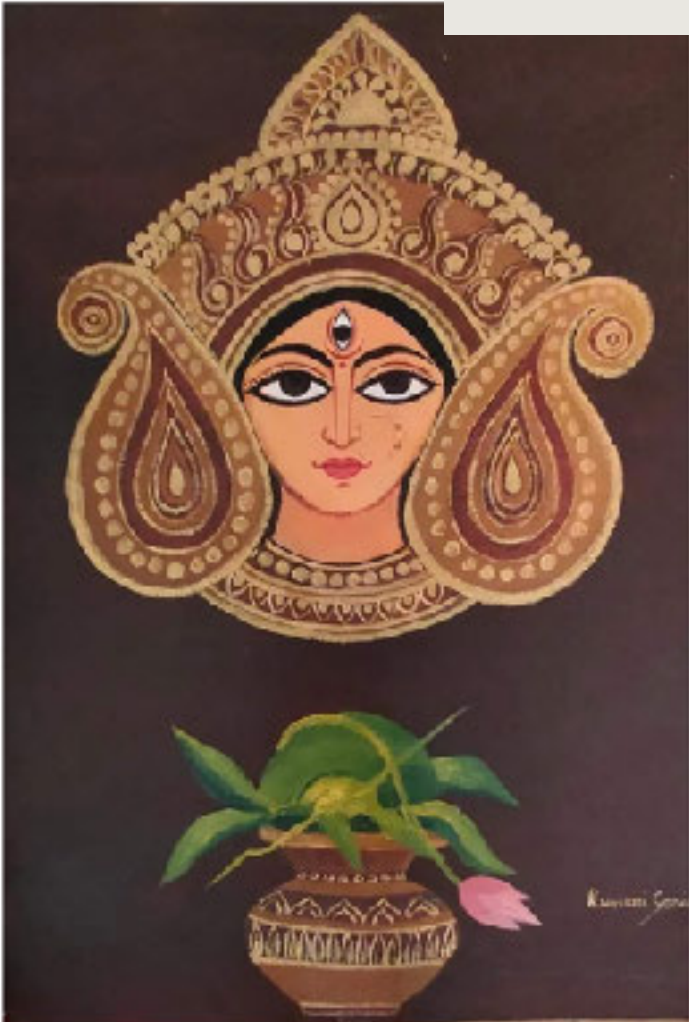

KISS has partnered with UNFPA since 2009 to transact LSE for adolescents in all schools. This partnership created a benchmark in the LSE Field and based its efficacy and many milestones, UNFPA is now collaborating with us to implement LSE in special schools across the state.

The Challenge for Education with Covid-19

The Covid-19 pandemic has **undoubtedly exacerbated pre-existing education disparities** by reducing the opportunities for many, especially for marginalised and indigenous communities. These inequalities are often further aggravated, by a **lack of access to technological facilities** making access education from remote locations, difficult.

This was a particular challenge for KISS, as our student body consists of tribal students from impoverished backgrounds. From a health perspective, as soon as the first case was announced in India in March, KISS sent its students back to their villages as a precautionary measure. Shortly thereafter, KISS joined hands with its sister organisations KIIT and KIMS, and various stakeholders, to initiate an action plan to help the worst-hit sections of society. Once our students were safely sent home, the challenge for us was to ensure that learning did not stop because of the pandemic.

Read below to learn about all our Covid-19 pandemic initiatives:

Healthcare Initiatives:

- ✓ India's first COVID Hospital at Kalinga Institute of Medical Sciences (KIMS) is ready and operational. This COVID Hospital is functioning from a block of KIMS with a dedicated team of doctors, nurses, paramedics and housekeeping staff.
- ✓ KISS Balangir & KISS Mayurbhanj are also functioning as COVID 19 hospitals, along with a further dedicated COVID 19 Hospital in Kandhamal in association with the district administration. These are each 200 bedded hospitals managed by KIMS and round the clock service following WHO and ICMR guidelines.



Education Initiatives:

- ✔ Both KIIT and KISS shut down well in advance before the state lockdown, giving time to the students to safely reach back to their homes. The Students of KISS were sent back with KISS representatives from different blocks so that they reach safely.
- ✔ KIIT is the first University to have begun online classes and online examinations for 30,000 children. In KISS, the students are in contact through what's app groups.
- ✔ Textbooks and allied study materials for the 30,000 students of all classes at their doorsteps. 4 consignments of materials were dispatched in 25 buses to 30 different districts in the State.
- ✔ KIIT is the first University to have begun online classes and online examinations for 30,000 children. In KISS, the students are in contact through Whatsapp groups.



Animal Care:

- ✔ KIIT & KISS started distributing food items such as green vegetables daily to stray monkeys. Though these monkeys and other animals are not susceptible to the virus itself, they have been severely affected by the COVID 19 outbreak mainly due to the lack of food which the residents used to provide. The two institutions also provided cooked food daily to other stray animals, including dogs, cows etc., living in areas from NALCC Square to the KIIT & KISS campuses in Patia.
- ✔ KIIT & KISS also adopted "People for Animals"- an NGO that takes care of 140 peacocks in Bhubaneswar. Besides this, financial assistance was provided to more than 10 "Goshalas" in Puri, Bhubaneswar and Cuttack.



Food Distribution:

- ✓ A team has been assigned to deliver cooked food to police personnel on duty. Lunch is provided every day to more than 2000 police personnel and other front-line warriors across Bhubaneswar, Odisha's capital city. Food is also delivered to police personnel in adjoining cities of Puri and Cuttack.
- ✓ KIIT & KISS also distributed groceries to 40,000 people in the slum areas of Bhubaneswar thrice a week for the first month during the lockdown. These packets contained items like rice, pulses, cooking oil. Food and essential items were also distributed in containment zones where people were not allowed to step out for days due to the risk of coronavirus.
- ✓ KIIT and KISS have extended a helping hand to the Tibetan communities in Jiranga and Chandragiri of Gajapati district in Odisha. Though the COVID-19 pandemic is not an immediate concern in this far-flung area of Odisha, hunger and poverty remain an issue in many settlements in and around Chandragiri.
- ✓ The KIIT and KISS family have provided basic essentials and grocery for at least a month to the Tibetan families settled in Chandragiri and to the monks of Padmasambhava Mahavihara Monastery in Jirang, the largest Buddhist monastery in Eastern India. Besides food, a kit containing essential items like sanitizers, hand wash, sanitary napkins and masks were also provided by KIIT and KISS, facilitated under the visionary leadership of Prof. Achyuta Samanta, Lok Sabha MP from Kandhamal and Founder of KIIT & KISS. Notably, KIIT and KISS have provided grocery for two old age homes in Chandragiri and have pledged to adopt both and take care of all finances henceforth. KISS is also supporting a hospital in Jiranga and has provided PPE to the health workers.



Looking after the Overlooked:

- ✓ KIIT and KISS extended a helping hand to the redlight areas in Bhubaneswar in the times of corona crisis. Dry and essential food items, groceries, sanitizers, masks and sanitary napkins were given with information about proper usage.
- ✓ KIIT, KISS, Sakha and Azim Premji Philanthropic Initiatives came together to distribute ration and essential items for the transgender community in Bhubaneswar, Rayagada and a few districts of Odisha. Many in the TG community who make their living from begging at street signals to other nondescript means of livelihood have suffered because of the current lockdown. As such, their life in normal times is full of hardships, and during these insidious times, their life has been miserable due to starvation and poverty.



Migrant Lives Matter:

- After the India-wide lockdown, a lot of unemployed migrant workers are stuck in cities with barely any resources. Many started retreating to their villages. With the loss of livelihoods, a large number of them struggle to support their families. KIIT and KISS also came forward to help the stranded labour in Odisha by providing them temporary shelter, cooked meals, sanitary products and arranging their travel back to their native place safely after the lockdown norms were relaxed. More than 1000 migrant workers were helped in this initiative by KIIT & KISS.



Aid to Spiritual Centres:

- Because of the lockdown of more than 90 days, devotees have been unable to attend places of worship despite the fact that rituals continued as usual. The priests who maintain it is facing times of crisis without any money. KIIT and KISS also extended help to the places of worship in Bhubaneswar, to the priests and other people who maintain the premises and to many Mathas in Puri by providing them grocery that would last three months and cash for other expenses.



Awareness & Dissemination:

- The students of KISS are creating awareness on Social Distancing, washing hands and respiratory hygiene in their respective districts. Besides under Project Uday massive awareness camps have been organised at market places and through a door to door campaign on Social Distancing, hand washing and proper usage of masks. 500 volunteers are involved for this purpose and 220 villages in aspirational districts of Rayagada, Koraput and Malkangiri has been covered. They are also helping the state government in monitoring and administering Quarantine Centers. The work covers 6 aspirational Districts of Odisha: Raygada, Malkangiri, Koraput, Kandhamal, Balangir, and Gajapati.



Sanitary Needs for Girls & Women:

- ✓ The students of KISS are creating awareness on Social Distancing, washing hands and respiratory hygiene in their respective districts. Besides under Project Uday massive awareness camps have been organised at market places and through a door to door campaign on Social Distancing, hand washing and proper usage of masks. 500 volunteers are involved for this purpose and 220 villages in aspirational districts of Rayagada, Koraput and Malkangiri has been covered. They are also helping the state government in monitoring and administering Quarantine Centers. The work covers 6 aspirational Districts of Odisha: Rayagada, Malkangiri, Koraput, Kandhamal, Balangir, and Gajapati.



Leveraging Power of Media & Technology

- ✓ Popular Odia literary magazine Kadambini founded by Prof. Achyuta Samanta was leveraged as a tool to keep people engaged at home as the lockdown prevailed. The Chief Editor of the magazine kept the readers engrossed through her exemplary storytelling. Free online versions were distributed.
- ✓ Awareness campaigns on the do's and don'ts of COVID19 along with the educational classes. The television channel also periodically ran government ads to create awareness and provide all relevant information on the virus.
- ✓ Online classes and examinations are being conducted across all centres and schools of the institute covering approximately 30,000 children. For students of KISS, some of whom live in the most backwards areas of the state, education through WhatsApp was being conducted. Now, KISS reaches them through television channel- Kalinga TV.
- ✓ KIIT-Technology Business Incubator (KIIT-TBI) is recognised as a Centre for Augmenting War with COVID-19 Health Crisis (CAWACH) under Department of Science and Technology (DST), Govt. along with similar institutes from IITs & other eminent Universities in India. KIIT-TBI is responsible for implementing this program in East & NE.
- ✓ E-Learning Class programme was inaugurated at Kalinga Institute of Social Sciences (KISS) under the initiative of KISS and Kalinga TV. Classroom teaching is the best and real mode of imparting education. However, due to the outbreak of coronavirus pandemic, schools and colleges have been shut down. KISS authority has provided hassle-free learning for students who are confined to their homes. The faculties and staff of KISS are in constant touch with the students, who were provided with textbooks and dry food items to ensure their study from home. Kalinga TV telecasts e-learning class for a period of half an hour every day. Even non-KISS students from every corner of Odisha will benefit from the e-classes.



Coordination & Collaboration

- ✓ KIIT and KISS is working with the Government of Odisha to provide support in the form of all its available resources – logistics, infrastructure, healthcare, human resources etc in its various activities at grassroots.
- ✓ KISS is also working closely with the American Embassy in the repatriation of American and Indian American personnel who have been stuck in Odisha and other adjoining areas.
- ✓ KISS is conducting a survey on behalf of UNDP India on migrant labour for a policy level change.
- ✓ KIIT and KISS in collaboration with US Consulate General Hyderabad virtually launched a project on Creating Covid-19 Awareness among Tribal Communities in Odisha. The project envisages engagement of youth volunteers and civil society organizations in creating awareness on Covid-19 and building resilience towards recovery in Koraput, Malkangiri, Nabarangpur, Rayagada, and Kandhamal districts.



Our Guiding Principles

- ✓ **Leaving No-one Behind** – To provide relief material and other necessities to homeless, stranded migrants, slum dwellers, daily wagers, transgenders, beggars, and animals on the street, frontline workers and other vulnerable people. It is putting forth to the Government needs of the poor and indigenous communities.
- ✓ **Mobilizing adequate and well-directed financing**– Reaching out to Good Samaritans, corporate houses, national and international organizations, KIIT and KISS has diversified work and mobilised financial and human resources for relief to the needy, distribution of hygiene products to women and girls, IEC material for wider dissemination (including in local and tribal languages) and setting up quarantine facilities and dedicated COVID-19 hospitals by utilizing the existing infrastructure facilities. In partnership with Government, needs and requirements of people are being identified and feedback loop to the government for action has been established.
- ✓ **Strengthening institutions for integrated solutions and effective implementation** – KIIT and KISS are working with the state government and local self-government institutions (urban and rural) to find solutions for the present crisis. Apart from enabling the state government to utilise our existing infrastructure, both these educational institutions have bolstered local action by utilizing staff and students as a volunteer force across Odisha. In this process, strong communication packages are being implemented to reach the most vulnerable.
- ✓ **Harnessing science, technology and innovation** – The science and technology hub is devising innovative and sustainable solutions and influencing government strategies. Research partnerships with Universities of Cambridge and East Anglia are now focused on food futures – by using volunteers and IVRS platform for benefit of indigenous communities.

While we pause to reflect on the effect of Covid19 on education, we realize that even this pandemic cannot dim our dreams. UNFPA



KISS, in partnership with United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), is implementing a project on "Adolescent Reproductive and Sexual Health (ARSH) and Life Skill Education (LSE) for about 10,000 adolescents at the institute and more than 2,00,000 across the state. The program aims to ensure provide vulnerable tribal children with a safer, informed and rewarding upbringing.

US Embassy India



Recognizing KISS' mission and contribution towards empowering the poorest of poor, the US Embassy has sponsored an "English Access Micro Scholarship Program". The program has been successful in gradually building up writing, reading, listening & speaking skills in English, for a group of selected students of KISS. The program provides a foundation of English language skills to over 550 talented students.

UNDP



UNDP, in association with KISS, has started a Skill Development programme in Odisha. Under this project a plethora of skill associated training will be provided to youth in remote regions, through online connectivity and having on-the-job training through local partnerships. The goal of the program is to provide livelihood options to underprivileged youth.

KISS is accredited with Guide-Star India because of its commitment towards enhancing Accountability and Transparency in the sector through good governance

UNICEF



UNICEF, in association with KISS, has established a **Children Development Resource Centre (CDRC)** as part of the larger UNICEF-KIIT University joint initiative for the **Centre for Children Studies (CCS)**. The goal is to promote evidence-based policy making, by building a knowledge base through action-research and other development programmes on children's issues, focusing on the state of Odisha. Hence, a resource centre at KISS has been established for students and research scholars.

Oracle



Oracle has granted a project to KISS for the creation of Smart Classrooms. Under the project, 200 classrooms with have interactive smart projectors and boards. This will provide interactive learning for Science, Technology, English and Math (STEM). These classrooms will augment the teaching learning capacities of teachers and students alike. Students from Class 1 to Class 10 can avail a new and enhanced form of learning.

University of East Anglia



KISS, in collaboration with the University of East Anglia has launched Project CHIRAG. This project will conduct evidence-based advocacy for building and reinforcing Sustainable Food Systems, under the overall rubric of achieving SDGs in India, at the national, state and local level.

Tata Institute of Social Sciences (TISS)



The MoU between TISS and KISS is aimed at establishing a framework for collaborative partnership on mutually agreed areas by promoting and co-opting human resources for undertaking research, curriculum and pedagogy development, livelihood & skill building, counselling, training program, seminar and workshops for teachers and students. This also aids capacity development of teachers along with providing holistic education to the tribal children.

Bernard van Leer Foundation



KISS, in collaboration with the Bernard Van Leer Foundation, has started the Mother-Tongue Based Multilingual Education (MT based MLE) to aid indigenous children enrolled in school. The organization has set up a language lab in which indigenous children are taught in their mother tongue so that they relate to their own culture when they first enrol in school. At a later age, they are gradually transitioned into Odiya-medium and English-medium education.

Give India



KISS is accredited with Give India. The main aim of Give India is to promote an effective and efficient giving culture that provides greater opportunities to the poor in India. It is a vibrant 'philanthropy marketplace' to ensure that the most effective and efficient non-profits get access to resources. After a thorough scrutiny, KISS has been listed under Give India and will now receive support for various activities.

University of Cambridge



KISS has initiated an exciting new research project 'Transforming India's Green Revolution by Research and Empowerment for Sustainable Food Supplies (TIGR2ESS)'. Awarded by Cambridge University, UK, KISS is a Lead Partner for this multi-year project. The project is the first of its kind, focusing on new technological innovations in the area of sustainable agriculture and nutrition security, going beyond the seed-fertiliser-water package of the Green Revolution.

British Council



British Council, in partnership with Diageo, has launched the Young Women Social Entrepreneurship Development Programme which is being implemented at KISS. British Council also provides E-library facilities which are availed by the tribal students, who can now access academic, non-academic literature and reference materials.

AIESEC



AIESEC provides students with the opportunity to pursue internships in international destinations. KISS annually receives approximately 15 international interns, who come through the AIESEC Internship Program.

FXB Suraksha

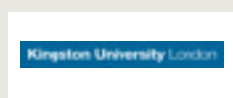

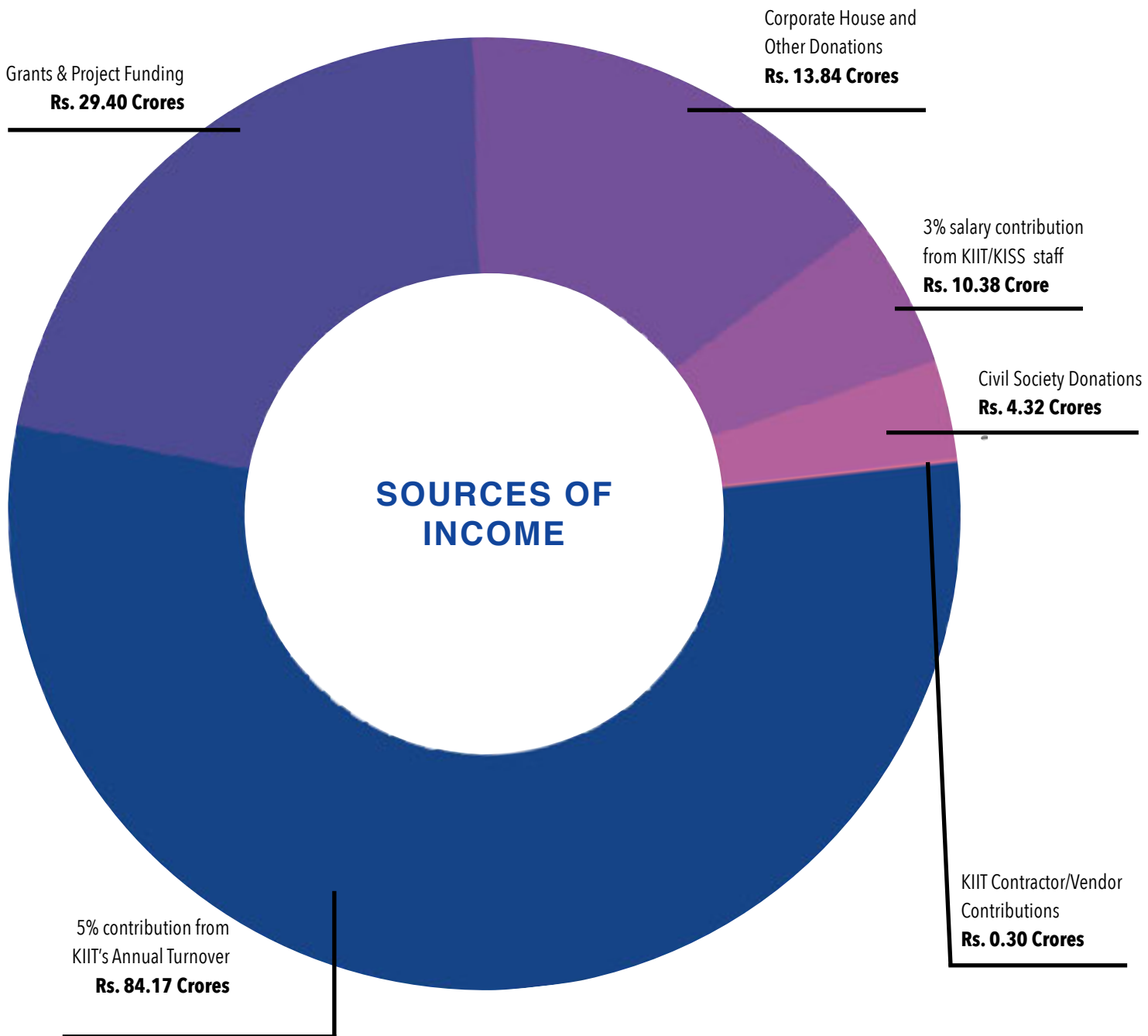

KISS Financials

Income & Expenditure for the Year



Kalinga Institute of Social Sciences (KISS) was started in the year 1993 with just 125 tribal students. With the growth of KIIT Group of Institutions, KISS has also grown as the biggest residential tribal institute of the country. KIIT is the backbone of KISS. Now, 60,000 tribal children of 62 tribes, including 13 primitive tribes, are pursuing their education from Class-1 to PhD level at KISS.



The sources of income of KISS are as follows;

The total receipts by way of donations & grants from various sources are **Rs. 145.98 crores** as detailed below:

- As per the resolution passed by the KIIT Society, 5% of the total turnover of KIIT. This financial KIIT has donated Rs. 84.17 crores operations.
- As per the statutory rules of the KIIT University, each and every staff contributes 3% of his/her gross salary to KISS amounting to Rs. 10.38 crores (approx.).
- The donations from civil society and well-wishers contribute benevolently for this noble cause amounting to Rs. 4.32 crores (approx.).
- Donations received from different organizations, corporate houses like Give India amounting to Rs. 13.84 cores (approx.).
- Further, Grants received for projects undertaken is Rs. 29.40 crores.
- Bank Interest and other miscellaneous receipts is Rs. 3.87 crores.
- Balance funds requirement was met from own sources / reserves, etc.

Total recurring expenditure for the year 2019-20 is Rs. 115.77 crores.

Total 5% seats in professional education programs of KIIT University are reserved for meritorious students from KISS. Several meritorious students from KISS are studying free of cost in KIIT Group of Institutions in technical and professional courses, such as Bachelor of Medicine & Surgery (MBBS), Dental Sciences & Surgery, Nursing, Engineering, Masters in Computer Application (MCA), Bachelor / Masters in Law, Management (MBA), Diploma in Engineering, etc. This involves a financial outlay of Rs. 20 crores (approx).

KIIT University also provides support services by way of visiting faculty, transpiration, maintenance for electricity / water supply system, medical assistance, security, etc. and these costs will add up to further Rs. 11.00 crores

Thus the **Overall Recurring expenses** will be in the range of **Rs. 146.77 crores.**







In addition the **Non- recurring expenses** during the year are **Rs. 36.06** crores.
